√	Likeness of Sinful Flesh: Jesus, while fully God, took on human nature, experiencing the weaknesses and of humanity, yet without
✓	Offering for Sin: Jesus' on the cross, atoning for the sins of humanity and reconciling us to God.
✓	Righteous Requirement of the Law: The standard of and that God demands, fulfilled in believers through the work of the Holy Spirit.
√	Walking According to the Flesh: Living according to and worldly standards, apart from the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit.
√	Walking According to the Spirit: Living in and the Holy Spirit, producing spiritual fruit and reflecting God's character.

3.	Explain the significance of Jesus being "in the likeness of sinful flesh" but without sin.
4.	Analyze the contrast between "walking according to the flesh" and "walking according to the Spirit" as presented in Romans 8:1-4. What are the implications of each for a believer's life?
5.	Explain the significance of the Holy Spirit in a believer's life, drawing specifically from Romans 8:1-4 and its emphasis on freedom from condemnation and power over sin.
6.	Discuss the concept of "being in Christ Jesus" as presented in Romans 8:1. What are the implications of this positional truth for a believer's identity and security?

7.	Romans 8:4 states that the "righteous requirement of the law" is fulfilled in believers. Discuss how this statement does not contradict the idea of salvation by grace through faith, but rather reveals the intended outcome of a life surrendered to God.
